IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR PARENTS/GUARDIANS ABOUT THE 2009-10 SCHOOL YEAR CALENDAR

Under the provincial government's Education Act it is mandatory for Ontario school boards to submit to the Ministry of Education an annual school year calendar that provides for a school year of no less than 194 days.

As you may be aware from recent media reports, the fact that Labour Day is very late this year (Monday, September 7, 2009) poses some challenges in determining the school board's calendar for the 2009-10 school year.

School traditionally begins each year on the Tuesday immediately following Labour Day.

However, this coming school year there are only 192 school days available in the period between Labour Day and the end of school on June 30, 2010. Therefore, any planned school year that would begin on the Tuesday following Labour Day and end on June 30 would not meet the requirements of the Education Act.

Both the Waterloo Catholic District School Board and the Waterloo Region District School Board are planning to bring their recommended school year calendars forward for approval on March 30, 2009.

This is a province-wide issue and we ask that you please be aware the 2009-10 school year will commence during the week prior to Labour Day this year.

We suggest that you consider vacation and child care plans that are appropriate to your family's needs under these circumstances.

The final 2009-10 school year calendar will be communicated to you immediately following its approval.

The Business & Information Technology Certificate is a certificate that complements your high school diploma with an area of concentration.

WHY GET IT?

- Acquire knowledge and skills suited to the workplace or for further study at the post-secondary level
- Photocopy and include with applications for employment

HOW DO YOU ATTAIN IT?

- One Business Technology course (BTT or BTA) or Computer Science course (ICS 3M)
- One additional "B" coded Business course

Plus any three of:

- All Business Studies courses ("B" codes)
- All Computer Science courses ("ICS" codes)
- Economics (CIA4U)
- 1 Law course (e.g. CLU3M)
- Mathematics for Personal Finance (MBF3C)
- Business or Information Technology Co-Op (counts as 2 credits)

And a minimum average of 60% across the five eligible BIT courses

Students can use the computer for word processing, email, spreadsheets, graphical presentations, and research to stimulate the reading-writing process.

Word Processing

- writing, editing, rewriting, formatting

E-mail/Texting

- communication with other students, parents/guardians
- contacting experts in a particular field of study

Spreadsheets

- collecting, organizing and manipulating data

Graphic Arts

- adding graphics, slides, and sound to presentations, or book reports
- creating illustrations for projects, seminars, or reports

Research

- searching the Internet to research a topic and to learn how to search, survey, prioritize, and to evaluate critically
- using information efficiently and intelligently for purposeful learning

IMPORTANT LITERACY TEST DATES

Literacy Parent Night for all grade 10 parents will occur during the interview night March 9th from 6:30-7:30, weather date the Tuesday, March 10th (we thought having it during the interview time may encourage more parents to come to the meeting and/or interviews)

February 16 to March 25: every Monday and Wednesday - after school literacy prep in room 210, 2:30-4:00

Beginning the end of February until the test date: period 1 and 5 Grade 10 classes using the computer lab for test practice and skill building.

March 3: all grade 10s will write the literacy practice test in period 2- we can then mark the test and have some directive support for those students who were unsuccessful
