## CATHOLIC TRUSTEES REVISE 2009-10 SCHOOL YEAR STUDENT START TIME

### STUDENTS TO BE IN CLASS BEGINNING SEPTEMBER 8, 2009

Trustees of the Waterloo Catholic District School Board tonight revised their March 30 decision regarding the 2009-10 school year student start time. Classes for students will now commence on Tuesday, September 8, 2009 rather than Tuesday, September 1, 2009 as previously decided.

The change will mean the WCDSB school year will begin for school staffs with professional development days on Thursday, September 3 and Friday, September 4, 2009. The last school day for Catholic students will be Tuesday, June 29, 2010. School staff will end the year with a professional development day on Wednesday, June 30, 2010.

The original school year calendar was recommended to Trustees of both the Waterloo Catholic and Waterloo Region District School Boards (WRDSB) by their respective senior educational staffs.

The senior officials believed a September 1 classroom start date would best meet the educational needs of students – particularly regarding maximizing the use of professional development days throughout the course of the school year.

Catholic Trustees supported the joint staff recommendation for a September 1 student start date unanimously. Public Board Trustees -- voting after having been apprised of the Catholic Board's decision -- instead chose a school start date of September 8.

"We stand fully behind the sound educational reasons the staffs of both boards recommended a September 1 school start date," said Board Chair Marion Thomson Howell. "However, the WRDSB's decision to choose a school start date significantly different than the one recommended by our staffs has created a great deal of uncertainty and confusion in the community. It has recently become clear that the community wants both Boards to begin classes on the same day and does not wish to see transportation funds needlessly wasted by the Boards starting on different dates. We are addressing those concerns by revising our classroom start date from September 1 to September 8, 2009".

The Waterloo Catholic District School Board, representing more than 100,000 Catholic school supporters, operates 52 schools and five adult education facilities serving more than 30,000 elementary, secondary and continuing education students in Waterloo Region – continuing a tradition of quality, inclusive, faith-based education first begun in 1836.

## **ANNUAL REQUEST FOR STUDENT IMMUNIZATION RECORDS - UPDATE**

Under the Immunization of School Pupils Act, Region of Waterloo is required to maintain the immunization records of all students in Waterloo Region. Enforcement of this Act ensures that students are immunized to protect both the student and the public from vaccine preventable diseases. Region of Waterloo Public Health collects and analyzes the immunization records of those students in elementary and secondary schools.

Secondary students will start receiving requests for immunization information in the mail in March 2009. Students who do not have complete records or legal documentation for exemption at Public Health may face suspension from school up to 20 days or until the records are completed and documentation is received.

### HOLOCAUST SURVIVOR RECALLS HORRIFIC WAR EXPERIENCES

Recently we were blessed with the presence of two holocaust survivors at our school: Faye Schulman and Mendel Good. Both told their stories of hardship and suffering.

Mendel Good was born on March 26th 1925 in Nowy-Sancz, Poland, he is the survivor of two ghettos, was imprisoned twice, and survived seven concentration camps. Before September 13th 1939 Mendel had two brothers, a sister, a mother and father and many aunts, uncles and cousins. By the end of the holocaust on May 8th 1945 Mendel was liberated and did not have a single relative left.



In 1939 Mendel's father was to be taken by the Germans and forced to work. However his older brother insisted on replacing his father and since Mendel was only a year younger, he was adamant to take his brother's position. Mendel talked about how that was his culture and he knew it was the right thing to do for his family. "When you speak about love, that was true love," Mendel said.

Mendel talked about how horrible the Germans treated the Jews even from the beginning: school was forbidden for him; he had to wear an armband with a Star of David to show everyone he was Jewish; when Germans were coming towards them on a sidewalk they would have to step down

and walk in the middle of the street. Mendel spoke how this whole experience made him feel:

"We had to walk on the road like animals." The Germans forced the Jews to be in their houses and have their doors locked by 6pm, and they were not allowed out on Tuesdays and Fridays until all the farmers had left, so they were unable to get food.

Mendel told many stories about how his father was taken to jail for no reason, how he was taken to camps alone when he was fourteen, and how he moved from camp to camp. One story he told was quite outstanding. When he was fourteen, he and eleven other kids around his age were told to stand in a line and were to be shot. Mendel was shot in the ear, fell to the ground and pretended he was dead. He was taken by truck to a grave site and thrown into a grave full of dead bodies; as he lay there he looked up and saw a familiar friendly face. The man who had thrown him in the grave was a Jewish man who worked at his family's bakery. Mendel was helped by this man and later ran home to the Jewish ghetto and met up with his brother.

Mendel Good told many inspirational stories and we can learn about our world's past from him. As one of the few survivors able to tell his story his audience comes away with a sense of astonishment that such a tragedy occurred, and how a man could survive everything that Mendel went through.

### **ST. BENEDICT'S SPECTACULARLY SKILLED SAINTS**

In April, fifteen students from St. Benedict gave it their all in the Skills Canada regional competition at Conestoga College, winning a total of four gold medals, four silver medals, and a bronze.

Skills Canada is a non-profit organization that is dedicated to promoting the skilled trades and technologies as career options for youth. This annual competition allows students to win medals doing what they enjoy.



"Seeing how well they can do is my

favourite part of the Skills Canada competitions," said Mrs. Crowell, Business and Co-op Program Area Head. The fact that students can win awards and be excited not only for themselves but for the other winners too is the real accomplishment.

Careers involving skilled trades and technologies are growing in society and by promoting them in a competition, students are being given a chance to prove just how well they can do. "Skills Canada is an excellent opportunity for students," Mr. Adamo, T/V video production advisor, stated.

Students have an equal opportunity to show their talents in these competitions. They can improve them with help from teacher advisors outside of school hours to prepare to compete. Skills Canada has provided a way for students to excel and feel great while doing it.

"They have taken this sense of accomplishment back into the classroom where it is having a positive impact on their learning," says Mr. Fage, Office IT advisor.

The competitions are catching on and as Mrs. Crowell states: "I like to see that it is growing." She has been involved for over nine years now and has seen St. Benedict start with five students entering the challenge - this has now risen to fifteen.

Provincials will take place at RIM Park in Waterloo on Monday May 4th and Tuesday May 5th. This is the largest skilled trades competition in Canada with more than 1 500 competitors, 30 000 spectators and more than 60 skilled trades contests. Elementary, Secondary and Post-Secondary students will all be involved and full of activity this day.

Last year Alicia Whalen competed in Restaurant Service and made it all the way to nationals in Calgary, winning a bronze medal.

With high hopes Alicia Whalen will be compete again along with the Home Build Team of Four: Sebastian Carvalho, Cody Cole, Kurt DaCosta, and Martin Vlcek at RIM park in May for provincials. Nathan Teixeira, Kyle Mackie, Nelson Monteiro, Amber Al-itawi, Michael Davison, and Brandon Finlay competed at Fanshawe College on Saturday, April 18th against several other school boards to try to gain a spot at the provincial OTSC to join Whalen and the Home Build Team.

Julia Sigurdson also exceeded at regionals. Sean deLottinville as well as Andrew Wanklin won medals and will hopefully compete again next year. All the students involved were able to gain valuable insight not only about their contest but also about themselves along the journey. Luck goes out to them all from St. Benedict in the future competitions and wherever else their skills will lead them.
