STUDENTS WARN TEACHERS ABOUT DANGEROUS CELL PHONE USE

Teachers got a wake-up call recently about enforcing the cell phone policy within the school. Student representatives from W.A.Y.V.E. (Working Against Youth Violence Everywhere) offered teachers a lesson in cell phones, showing how potentially dangerous they can be to the community as some teenagers use the communication devices to buy drugs, spread gossip, and torment students.

During a recent staff meeting, Melanie Henriques and Amanda Conde delivered an impassioned presentation that highlighted the concerns W.A.Y.V.E. has around the use of cell phones. By bringing attention to the few cases of improper cell phone activity in the school, they tried to show teachers how to put a stop to the abuse. They explained in detail the strategies students employ to avoid detection in the hopes that teachers can catch the offenders before they can do any damage.

"We need teachers to be more diligent with the cell phone policy," Miss Henriques pleaded. "You might think text messages don't mean much, but the consequences can be devastating."

Miss Henriques and Miss Conde shared heartfelt stories about how younger students can sometimes get involved in fights, bullying, and drug use through the use of cell phones. "With wireless technology, everything spreads so much faster," explained Miss Henriques. "People can get personal information from someone's Facebook page and use it against them by texting all their friends with nasty comments. Gossip spreads so much faster now because people don't have to wait to be face-to-face anymore."

The W.A.Y.V.E. presentation also showed teachers how some students use cell phones to start fights through electronic taunting. They also use the technology to arrange a time and place to fight. Not only that, with built-in camera phones, students will record the actual fight and post it on the Internet. W.A.Y.V.E. believes that if teachers can intercept the calls within their classrooms and in the hallways by confiscating cell phones, they can prevent unnecessary violence in the school.

The student presenters also shocked teachers with stories about drug use by a small group of students in the school and how these teenagers can buy marijuana using cell phones. According to a recent poll by Project Teen Canada, almost one-third of teens (31%) use marijuana on a regular basis, and Miss Henriques described how these teenagers at our school use a cell phone to order the illegal drug. "If a student wants to get weed (marijuana), they can text a friend first thing in the morning and get it by the end of first period," said Miss Henriques. "It's insane how easy it is, and you teachers have no idea what's going on."

The presentation opened many eyes in the packed lecture hall, including W.A.Y.V.E. teachersupervisor Mrs. Nada Offak. "When the girls asked us if they could talk to teachers at a staff meeting, we knew it must be serious," said Mrs. Offak. "After listening to them, it's obvious we need to take a hard-line approach to cell phone use or else it's going to destroy all the hard work we've done to make our community a safe place to learn."

In the near future, W.A.Y.V.E. hopes to bring their cautionary message to parents through the School Council. "Parents need to know how wireless technology can get their teenagers into trouble," explained Mrs. Offak. "Parents buy their kids cell phones and pay for the monthly bills, but they need to know what they're paying for. They need to ask what's going on in all those text messages."

Now that students have sent out a warning message about cell phone abuse, it's up to teachers to answer the call.

All grade 9's enrolled in either Grade 9 Applied or Academic Math classes during semester 2 will be writing the EQAO's provincial Math Test over two days - on Tuesday, June 9th and Wednesday, June 10th. This test will be written during their regularly-scheduled Math class, and will take the full period on both days. It is important that students be prepared for this test, since the EQAO is worth half of their final exam, or 15% of their final, overall mark. Students should already be preparing in their classes by working on practice materials provided by their teacher, but there are also tonnes of on-line resources available to families so that students can practice at home. WELL-PLANNED PROM PROMISES THE SAFETY AND FUN OF ST. BENEDICT GRADUATES

St. Benedict graduates attended their senior Prom Friday, May 8th with hopes of the night being one they'll always remember.

This year's "Old Hollywood" themed Prom was held at Federation Hall at the University of Waterloo and ran from 7:30 pm until midnight. It was important to those planning the event that the graduates had a wonderful evening, but considered their safety to be the top priority as dozens of teachers supervising the event displayed.

"It is always mandatory [to have Police officers at Prom]," Marlie Melo, grade eleven student in charge of planning the formal explains. "We believe in the safety of the students."

In the week leading up to Prom, there were campaigns all around the school to raise awareness of the importance of safe driving and decision making. An emotional assembly closed the week, featuring a comedian named Stu, and the parents of Chris Robbins, a deceased St. Benedict student who passed away last year. Robbins' parents encouraged students to vow to make smart decisions on the road whether they be a driver of a vehicle or a passenger.

There were no problems with alcohol or substance abuse with more than 300 students who attended the event. Each student was searched upon entry of the hall, and tight security ensured that once students exited the building they were not allowed back in.

says. "The hall actually was booked last year, the theme was [chosen at] the beginning of the year, and meetings with Lynn and Kyle happened in about March."

Many students think adding a dinner before Prom would make the night more enjoyable and easier on everyone. However, Melo isn't so sure that it would be easier, explaining that, "Everyone before Prom is doing their hair and at parks or by the river taking pictures, [so time may become an issue]."

The "Old Hollywood" theme was complete with a red carpet, tables and chairs covered in white cotton fabric, a dance floor that illuminated the hall with white twinkle lights hung above, and a variety of music for all tastes provided by Planet Goodtime.

Many graduates were pleased once they found out there would be no issue with reserving their tickets, due to the unfortunate situation of some grade twelves last year. Federation Hall is a very large venue and the number of tickets available exceeded three hundred. However, last year St. Benedict's Prom venue wasn't large enough to allow every graduate to attend.

It isn't decided yet if Marlie Melo will be on the Dance Committee next year or if it'll be another position in Student Activities she'll obtain. However, if security, supervision, and planning pan out similarly to this year, there's no doubt that next year's Prom should be both fun and safe for graduates.

Although this event turned out very well and graduates were very happy with their Prom, some future graduates have worries. There are some parents who believe they should have the opportunity to participate in the event in some manner, whether it be with the planning process or supervising students at the formal.
