Unless it is explicitly stated that the school is closed, students should make every effort to attend. Classes





The OSSLT is now less than 4 months away. Let's continue our preparations by looking at a Ministry document entitled "Me Read, No Way! A Practical Guide to Improving Boys Literacy." (All readers can still benefit.)

1. "Have the Right Stuff"

- simply put, continue to offer a variety of reading materials that appeal to as wide an audience as possible
- look for texts that are visual (books based on movies, cartoons, or other multimedia experience)
- look for texts that are humorous, sustain engagement, or are edgy of controversial

2. "Help Make It a Habit"

- continue to make reading and writing an "intentional, persistent, and empathetic focus" in the classroom
- create links between reading and writing by:
 1. discussing models of good writing in detail (exemplars), pointing out obvious successful elements
 2. emphasize how the author's word selection reflects the intended purpose of the text

- continue to structure lessons with an obvious purpose/clear goals
