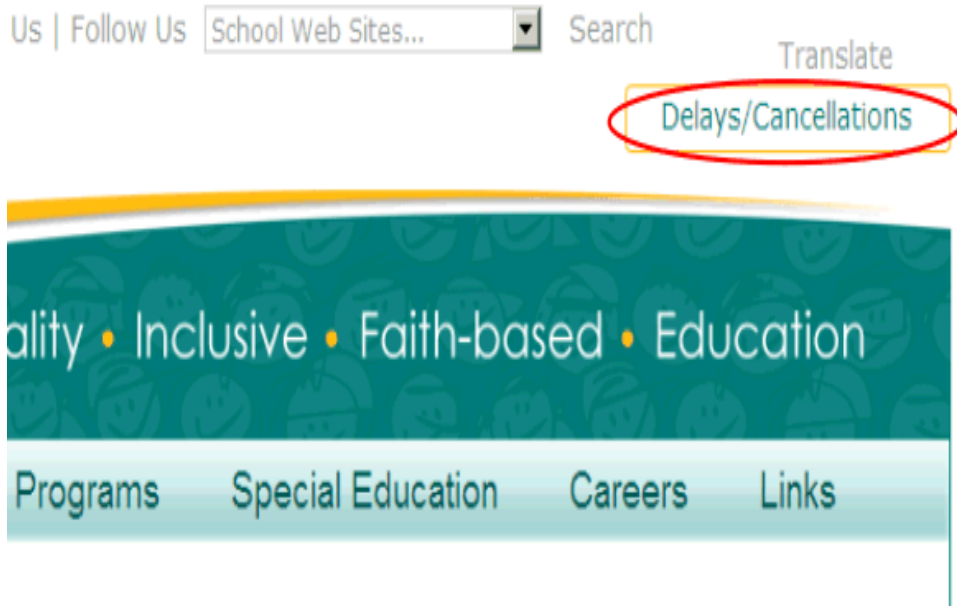

Inclement Weather Procedure

When the weather is bad in the morning, please listen to your local Waterloo Region radio station. For example 96.7 CHYM FM has cancellations at the :15 and :45 of every hour. Other stations you may want to listen to include: KOOL FM (FM 105.3), 570 News (AM 570), KIX (FM 106.7), C JOY (AM 1460), DAVE FM (FM 107.5), MAGIC FM (FM 106.1), OLDIES 1090 (AM 1090) or FAITH FM (FM 94.3). Most local radio stations also have this information posted on their website as well.

Your best source for information when bad weather hits is our school board's website. Check out our board's web site at www.wcdsb.ca for the **RED cancellations button**. One click will tell you if your bus is cancelled and/or school is closed.



Unless it is explicitly stated that the school is closed, students should make every effort to attend. Classes will continue, and the onus will be on students to get caught up on work they miss.

DISASTER DISTRACTION

The recent earthquake in Haiti produced a humanitarian crisis of immense proportions. In response, the world community is naturally responding with massive amounts of aid. (The Bennies community donated \$10,093.77.) Much more will be needed to rebuild Haiti in the coming decade.

Disasters, such as the one in Haiti, can distract us from the many other world wide humanitarian crises that existed before the Haitian earthquake. One billion people still go to bed very hungry every night. 28,000 children still die daily from water born diseases. Children in Sierra Leone still remain illiterate because they do not have access to a school and teacher.

We rightly donate significant amounts to aid Haitians in their recovery. St. Benedict's Lenten giving project this year will be to raise funds to build a school in Sierra Leone, Africa. The cost for the school is \$8500. February 10 will also be our Valentine's Day Dress Up, where students can wear a Red, Pink, or White shirt with their uniform pants.

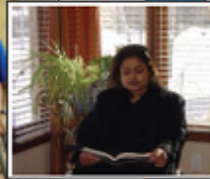
