NEWS FROM THE CHAPLAIN

As you read this, students Lauren Hummel, Allie McKinnon, and teacher Nick Betik are in the Dominican Republic. They are there November 13 to 20 on a Board-sponsored justice experience. The purpose of the trip is as follows: "The poor and the marginalized, by virtue of their history and lived experience have come to the conclusion that the rest of the world does not care about them. Rather than receiving donations of used clothing or school supplies from the visiting groups, what the poor and marginalized value most is to


know finally that people do care. They see the care and concern in the eyes of the visitors; they hear it in their questions and in their reactions of abhorrence to the living conditions witnessed and the lack of justice seen so clearly for perhaps the first time in their lives".

The hope is that when participants return home, they will continue to educate themselves on the issues related to poverty and injustice and will begin to work for systemic change rather than working for and supporting charity alone.

Bullying Awareness and Prevention Week is November 15 to 19 and is an important way to focus the school community on promoting a safer learning environment for all students, which is essential to their success. It is also a valuable opportunity to raise awareness of bullying-related issues with students and parents. At St. Benedict we will bring awareness to this issue through daily prayer, announcements and special events. On Tuesday, November 16 and Wednesday, November 17 students are encouraged to wear a blue shirt with their uniform bottoms to support Bullying prevention.

November 19 is the 24-hour Vow of Silence Day in our school. The vow begins at the final bell on Thursday, November 18 and runs until the final bell on Friday, November 19. The purpose of the vow is to stand with those who have no voice. People who have no voice may be able to speak and communicate in other ways, but they are unable to change their circumstances because no one listens to them. Because nobody listens to them, they are denied the basic human rights you and I take for granted. They are denied basic health care that keeps them healthy and alive. They don't have access to education. Their employers refuse to pay a living wage. They don't have access to clean water and a safe place to live. By vowing to be silent for 24 hours, we stand with the voiceless.

The Christmas season marks the 21st year we are collaborating with the Cambridge firefighters to provide Christmas baskets to families in Cambridge who are struggling financially. Homeroom classes, groups of classes, and families are encouraged to sponsor a family. Talk about the possibility as a class or family. Let the chaplain, Bob Rempel, know that you will sponsor a family (cost is \$100 ish), and start collecting money. I will get the family information to you as soon as I receive it. We will present the Christmas baskets to the firefighters on December 10 at our Faith Assembly.



BULLYING AWARENESS WEEK

Bullying Awareness and Prevention Week is November 15 to 19. All week we will be sharing information around Bullying. What it is, statistics around bullying and how to prevent it.

DID YOU KNOW?

Bullying is characterized by acts of intentional harm, repeated over-time, in a relationship where an imbalance of power exists. It includes physical actions (punching, kicking, biting), verbal actions (threats, name calling, insults, racial or sexual comments), and social exclusion1

(spreading rumours, ignoring, gossiping, excluding). Boys tend to be more likely to bully and be bullied, usually in the form of a physical attack and exhibition of aggressive behaviour. Alternatively, girls appear to be more prone to indirect bullying in the form

of social isolation, slandering and the spreading of rumours.

In Canada, studies suggest that roughly 6% of students aged 12 to 19, report bullying others on a weekly basis, 8% report that they are victims of bullying weekly, and 1% report that they are both victimized and bully others on a weekly basis.

Bullying surveys also indicate that many more boys than girls report being victims of bullying and almost all boys named male peers as the primary bully. A recent self report survey on delinquency among Toronto youth indicates that 16% of youths in grades 7 to 9 had been bullied on more than 12 occasions during the year prior to the survey.

BULLYING PREVENTION

- Pope John Paul II said, "To work for peace is the concern of all individuals and of all people. And because everyone is endowed with a heart and with reason and has been made in the image of God, he or she is capable of the effort of truth and sincerity which strengthens peace."
- If you are being bullied at St. Benedict, always tell an adult. It's hard to talk about serious things with adults sometimes, but they can help put a stop to bullying. Tell an adult that you trust and can talk to your parents, your teacher, your guidance counsellor, your coach.
- If you are being bullied online, don't reply. This may actually make the bullying worse.
 Instead, be sure to tell a family member or another adult you trust. If possible, block any more communications from this person. Save evidence of the bullying. If you get a nasty email, print it out or save it so that you can show it to an adult.
- If you are a witness to bullying, support the person, speak up and report it to an adult. Many people who are being bullied are afraid to tell. Have the courage to make a difference and prevent bullying.
- If your child is being bullied at school, listen to them, talk to them and call the school. You can call the guidance department or administration if you have a concern.

NEXT STEPS

As a school community we continue to work to prevent bullying. Grade 9 students transition into high school through LINK. Teachers volunteer to engage our student body in various programs in arts, sports, and other special interests.

Community Justice Initiative and our guidance department work with students through our mediation programs. This year we are addressing the barriers between people in our building by participating for the first time in Challenge Day.

Every school in the Waterloo Catholic District School Board is committed to prevent bullying. St. Benedict is inviting students to join our Safe Schools Committee. This is your opportunity to make a difference, pick up an application package if you have not done so yet in the office. Help be part of the solution—help prevent bullying.

POST-SECONDARY TIMELINE

- 1. Grade 12 students should still continue to do specific institution research at the E-info site (www.electronicinfo.com) for university and www.ontariocolleges.ca site.
- 2. On-line application tutorials will also help students gather the information that will be needed for the eventual application process.
- 3. Now is also a great time to arrange for a campus visit or tour at institutions that are of interest. Most colleges and universities typically host these events in the fall, as well as in the spring. Check the guidance bulletin board as well as your email distribution list updates for more information about specific school open house dates.
- 4. OUAC PIN numbers are now available in the Guidance Office for pick-up. PIN numbers are needed for university application. College application requires students to use their OEN numbers (found on all report cards) to set up their college application accounts.
- 5. Try to complete you application prior to leaving for the Christmas break as both the OUAC and OCAS systems tend to become overloaded as the deadline for applications approaches.
- 6. Review your semester two timetable to make sure that you have all of the necessary pre-requisite courses.
- 7. Complete your Community Service Hours!!
- 8. Be prepared to wait for confirmation of acceptance from schools. Each institution has its own timeline. Try not to let anxiety about acceptance interfere with your progress at school.

Anyone who is interested in obtaining uniform clothing should contact their guidance counsellor.
