## **Attention Grade 12 Potential Graduates!!**

All Grade 12 students who are planning on graduating this June are reminded that Community Service Hours need to be completed and handed in to the main office by the end of May. Completing a minimum of 40 hours of community service is an important, and required, component of earning your high school diploma and we cannot grant your diploma until this important step is completed and recorded at the school. Although this is important for all students, it is especially important for students who have applied to college or university as any offer that you have received is conditional upon completion of all graduation requirements – including your community service hours. Please take care of this important detail.

# **Grade 12 Post-Secondary Information Update**

- 1. All students can expect to hear an admission response to all university programs that they applied to by May 29, 2014. Students interested in accepting an offer of admission should do so by June 2, 2014.
- 2. The Admission Information Service (AIS) will be available through OUAC (Ontario University Application Center) from early June to August for applicants who have not been accepted to

programs of their choice or for students who still wish to apply to university for September. All known openings in all university programs will be posted by the AIS at www.ouac.on.ca/ais/

- 3. Students who did not apply to college are still welcome to apply on-line for September, 2014 to any program that is still accepting applications. See www.ontariocolleges.ca for more information.
- 4. If you are planning to attend the Graduation Ceremony at Conestoga College on Wednesday, June 25 and have not registered to attend, this detail needs to take place ASAP as the registration deadline has passed.

#### **Summer School**

Summer school will be available this summer for St. Benedict students through the Waterloo Region District School Board, our coterminous board. Selected.make-up credit courses will be offered at Jacob Hespeler Secondary School in Cambridge and Cameron Heights Secondary School in Kitchener. A selected number of new credit courses will be offered at Jacob Hespeler Secondary School in Cambridge, Sir John A. Macdonald Secondary School in Waterloo and Bluevale Collegiate in Waterloo. Classes will begin on Wednesday, July 2 and will run until Friday, July 25. Make-up courses are 3 hours in length, either morning or afternoon, while new credit courses are 6 hours in length, not including a 30 minute nutrition break. Students can register for a maximum of 2 make up credits or one new credit course. In addition to these two options, there are also a selected number of on-line blended courses being offered. # History Students Commemorate WWII "Operation Overlord"

## Three St. Benedict students take honours

The Laurier Centre for Military Strategic and Disarmament Studies, in partnership with the Waterloo Catholic District School Board, and St Jerome's University, are pleased to announce the winners of the Operation Overlord: Canadians in D-Day and the Normandy Campaign contest.

This contest was open to all grade 10 students in Waterloo Region as part of the greater national commemoration of the 70th anniversary of the Allied invasion of Europe and the liberation of France in 1944.

All entrants were required to describe the experiences of Canadian soldiers, airmen, sailors or medical personnel (including nurses) involved in the Allied invasion of France in 1944 and the Normandy Campaign that followed. Their entries could be expressed as an essay, poem, song, video, diary entries or a piece of art work. Entries

were judged based upon their historical authenticity, originality, creativity and ability to make the judges feel that the author has experienced the event (Operation Overlord and the Normandy Campaign).

A total of five finalists were chosen from all entries received during first and second semester, and will receive a book prize containing a package of LCMSDS's top Normandy-related publications. The top three entries will receive a cash prize (1st place \$350 / 2nd place \$150 / 3rd place \$100). The five finalists are: Ben Faria (Video) - St. Mary's HS (1st Place), Connor Goliath (Short Story) - St. Benedict CSS (2nd Place), Cameron Jakub (Poetry) - St. Mary's HS (3rd Place), Emma Kelly (Poetry) - St. Benedict CSS, and Areeba Quereshi (Diary) - St. Benedict CSS.
