

Access your student's attendance information in real time

Class attendance is a key component to a student's success in their classes. Timely communication of attendance information between home and school is critical for accurate attendance records.

If a student is away from school a parent must call the attendance line at the school at 519-621-4001. The call can be placed any time, 24 hours a day. It is strongly recommended that you make this call as soon as the absence is known, or at the latest before the student returns to school.

If your son or daughter is going to be away for a trip or extended period of time for a medical reason an *Intent to be Absent* form should be completed in advance by a parent. These are available in the Guidance department.

A student, parent or guardian can access their student's attendance in real time through the Secondary Student Information System (SIS) Website. Information available to view includes student mark history, current timetable, attendance for each course on the current timetable and your contact information. The website link is https://sis.wcdsb.ca.

To access the student specific information, you must have the student number (which can be found on a student's timetable) and birth date. If you cannot locate the student number please call the guidance or attendance office for assistance.



Navigating information regarding the many and varied options for post-secondary education can be a daunting and overwhelming task for both students and parents. If you, and your sons and daughters are struggling with the wide variety of decisions available, consider taking advantage of the following opportunities:

- 1. Attend one of the many individual college or university presentations that are being hosted here at the school. These presentations take place at various times during the school day and provide an excellent window into all that different schools have to offer. A full list of presentations is available on the St. Benedict web site.
- 2. Sign up for our email distribution list. The information distributed pertains to presentations, events, scholarships and deadlines regarding post–secondary options. Parents are more than welcome to be part of this list! Joining is easy go to the Guidance section of the web site and click on the message that says "join our information list." Email updates will come to you via Mr.Betik on behalf of the guidance department.
- 3. Post-Secondary Information Night for Parents will be held in conjunction with Parent/Teacher Interviews on Thursday, October 29. Please join the guidance staff in the Lecture Hall at 7:00 PM for a presentation, followed by a time of questions and answers.
- 4. College CIP Day at Conestoga College will take place on Wednesday, October 21. The open house format will be available from 10:30 AM 1:30 PM and from 5:00 PM 7:00 PM. Representatives from all Ontario Colleges will be available to answers questions about their campuses and their programs.
- 5. The Cambridge area University Information Presentation Night is being hosted here at St. Benedict on Thursday, November 5 from 7:00 PM 9:00 PM. All Ontario Universities will be represented at this event and attendees will have opportunity to attend 3, 30 minute presentations, as well as to have time to circulate at the end of the evening.
- 6. Research your options and get the most up to date information on-line. For college information go to www.ontariocolleges.ca and for university information go to www.electronicinfo.ca Both of these sites contain a wealth of information on programs and requirements.

Community Service Hours

Completing 40 hours of Community Service is an important graduation requirement that needs to be completed in order for students to earn their Ontario Secondary School Diploma. While many students are able to find places to fulfill this requirement on their own, we are also often contacted by community organizations and groups who are seeking volunteers. As these opportunities become known to us, they will be listed in the BENN and posted on both the Ranger system and the bulletin board outside of the guidance office. Current opportunities include the following:

- 1. Volunteer help is needed with the up-coming Academic Awards Night. Anyone looking for 2-4 hours of extra community service is invited to sign the list in the guidance office. Help will be needed to set up after school, as well as during the evening event.
- 2. Austism Ontario is seeking volunteers to help with their Halloween event. This event will take place on October 25 from 5:30 8:30 PM and is for children with ASD and their siblings.

- Volunteers will need to be available at 5:00 PM to help with set up and will earn 4 hours of Community Service. Ideally they would like to find 6 10 students. Please see Mrs.Klassen in the guidance office for further details.
- 3. Cambridge Public Health is seeking a "Youth Engagement Leader" to implement and evaluate health promotion targeting youth in schools and in the community. This position would be suitable for an older high school student. More information as well as an application is available at www.regionofwaterloo.ca/impact
- 4. If you enjoy the outdoors and are passionate about the environment, consider checking out the various opportunities that rare Charitable Research Reserve offers. Opportunities exist in conservation, research, education, events, fundraising and office administration. Walk-In Counselling Available at Cambridge "Front Door"

Do you have concerns about your teenager's behavior, emotional state, or mental health? Are you concerned about possible self-harm or drug use issues? Are these issues creating family conflict for you? The Walk-In Counselling at Front Door helps families with children up to 18 years of age to get started on the road to understanding. Through a single family counselling session, the experienced counsellors there help identify issues and equip families with tools and strategies to address their concerns. The focus of the session is determined by each family's unique needs. The Cambridge office is located at 35 Dickson Street. Walk-In counselling hours are Tuesdays from 12 Noon to 7:30 PM (last appointment at 6:30 PM). Appointments are available on a first come basis and are free of charge. Family member directly involved in the concern are encouraged to attend.

What is Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM)?

The Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM) is a Ministry approved program that encourages students to focus their education on a specific employment sector.



Components include:

Students who successfully complete all components of the program earn a Specialist High Skills Major (Red Seal) designation on their Diploma.

Bennie's business grad shares experiences

Most times when a guest speaker is brought into St. Benedict's to speak at the lecture hall it is uninteresting and tiresome. Normally, not many listen and pass the hour twiddling thumbs and wishing to be somewhere else. Things were different when Amad Abdullah came to speak. From the get-go he was different, exciting even; a trait that many guest speakers tend to lack nowadays. He was



enthusiastic and passionate about what he was speaking of. He was so interesting and inspirational that when his speech was over, instead of wishing it would finish, I was upset it was over.

Amad Abdullah is a former St. Benedict student and a graduate of business from the University of Wilfred Laurier. He is largely known over Canada as the founder and CEO of the uprising social media fitness smartphone application, OneSet. In

December 2015, he is expected to air on the popular Canadian reality television show, Dragons Den as a contestant. Abdullah did not speak of the outcome of the show as he signed a contract disclosing him to state the outcome, but throughout his presentation he made it seem rather obvious that he found success with the show. OneSet is currently valued at a two million dollars, but the company looks to grow off of the upcoming publicity from Dragons Den when it airs.

Abdullah spoke his life story, his struggles growing up and the failures that he overcame all throughout his life. Amad Abdullah spoke of his education; he said was not the greatest student and that he just slipped into the cracks of making it into university. He mentioned that he had an unexpected pregnancy which led to him having a son in his early twenties. After that, he spoke of how his peers thought he would be average and emerge to nothing because of the unexpected pregnancy, but he did not see things that. Still motivated and determined, Abdullah saw nothing but success in his life. He joined a network in Waterloo which allowed great minds to communicate and that is where he found his big break, with his



invention of OneSet. With Amad Abdullah speaking on a personal level, he showed the audience that anyone can be successful with the right mindset. The most important part of his whole speech was when he gave advice, personally, some of the best advice I have ever heard, he said:

"If you ever find yourself on the edge about something, and you're scared to do it because you might be rejected, do it anyways. People are scared of what if; what if I get shut down, what if I look silly? Who cares!? What if you don't? What if something amazing is created just because you did something about it."

Amad Abdullah taught me to be more confident as a person. When I spoke to him after his speech, he told me personally that he has failed ninety-nine out of one hundred times. That one time he didn't fail, that one time he found success with OneSet, that it is what changed his life, not the failures. Nobody hears about the failures, only the success.
