Quick Facts

Participating schools across Ontario completed the 6-Step Healthy Schools Process, which aligns with the Ministry of Education's Foundations for a Healthy School This process guides a school community through planning and implementation of a range of activities for a selected priority health topic. The process is annual, repeating each school year, and flexible for all communities across Ontario to sustain year over year. School teams focus on one of the following six health topics:

- · Physical Activity
- · Healthy Eating
- Personal Safety and Injury Prevention
- Growth and Development
- Mental Health

· Substance Use, Addictions and Related Behaviours

While a healthy school community aims to promote health in all six of the interconnected health topics, selecting a priority health topic based on each school community's needs and assets helps focus the work of the school team. By focusing on one health topic comprehensively across as many of the five Foundations for a Healthy School areas as possible, schools are better positioned to have a deeper impact on their broader school communities.

The Kenya Experience

Last fall, along with my colleague Lisa Mackay, Vice Principal at Monsignor Doyle, we began discussions with our director, Loretta Notten about the possibilities of implementing a Service Learning Program at the Waterloo Catholic District School Board. Her experience travelling to Kenya in the summer of 2017 with ME to WE, challenged us to dream a little about what this could mean for our board and our schools in Cambridge. Fast forward several months, and we are excited and proud, that these sessions of dreaming and discussion have led us to be able to offer a credit based, Service Learning Program for grade 11 and 12 students at St. Benedict and Monsignor Doyle in 2018-2019. This includes a trip to Kenya in May 2019. We are modelling this program after a similar one that has been running at St. Joan of Arc in the Simcoe Muskoka Catholic Board for 10 years.

On May 3, Lisa and I were privileged with the opportunity to travel with a group of 26 students and 6 staff members from Joan of Arc, to Kenya to experience the program and continue to plan for our students for next year. While in Kenya, we spent time learning about the local culture and hearing stories of life in the Masai Mara. We visited local schools and hospitals supported by WE and had the opportunity to participate in a build project for a WE College.

Everywhere we went we were greeted with huge smiles and heartfelt welcomes. It is amazing to see pure

joy and gratitude of people who live so simply. It challenged me to think what I value in my own life that seems so full of so many material things. While in Kenya I was struck by the significance of the impact that WE has had and continues to have on the communities we visited. It became very evident to me that the interconnection of the 5 Pillars (Education, Water, Health, Food, Opportunity) provide a sustainable model of development that is truly having an impact on people's lives.

Travelling to Kenya has solidified my belief that providing these types of experiences, grounded in an academic program are integral to our mission as Catholic educators. For me, working for justice is a fundamental message of the gospel and critical piece of Catholic Social teaching. Personally, this experience reminded me that in my busy and often chaotic life, I cannot lose sight of things that are truly important---relationships with others and my commitment to live my faith through witnessing the preferential option for the poor.



I continue to process all of the experiences we had and all of the people we met. I know for certain that this experience has provided me with many new perspectives and re-energized my passion and commitment to social justice and to developing these opportunities for our students. I am excited and filled with hope about what the future holds.

Summer School

There are several options available this summer for students who wish to attend summer school. Our board will be offering a selection of New Credit Courses through St. Louis is Kitchener. These courses will run from July 3 – July 26 (final exam July 27), from 8:30 AM – 3:30 PM, Monday to Friday. All classes will run at St. Louis is Kitchener, with the exception of Career Studies and Civics which will only available on-line. While transportation is not required, teachers will distribute 2 bus tickets at the end of each school day, to students who require transportation. These bus tickets will allow students use of the GRT transit system. Summer school will be available this summer for St. Benedict students through the Waterloo Region District School Board, our coterminous board. Make-up Credit Courses will be offered at Jacob Hespeler Secondary School in Cambridge and Huron Heights Secondary School in Kitchener. A selected number of New Credit Courses will be offered at Jacob Hespeler Secondary School in Kitchener. Classes will run from July 3 – July 27. Make-up courses are 3 hours in length, either morning or afternoon, while new

credit courses are 6 hours in length, not including a 30-minute nutrition break. Students can register for a maximum of 2 make up credits or one new credit course. There will also be a limited number of Online Blended Courses offered at all locations this summer as well. More information regarding summer school course offerings and registration is available in the guidance office. The registration deadline for New Credit, On-line Blended, and Locally Developed courses is Tuesday June 26. Students planning to take an On-line Blended course must be registered by Thursday June 21st. Transportation is provided for students who take summer school courses through the public board – a bus schedule will be available to students in June. Please see the guidance office for more information regarding summer school.

Grade 12 Reminders

- While most Grade 12 students have likely completed their required 40 hours of Community Service, there are many students who have not yet handed their documentation of this into the main office. Please remind your sons and daughters to take care of this important detail as soon as possible. This is a necessary requirement for all graduates and students who do not complete this requirement in a timely manner risk losing their graduation status, as well as conditional offers that they may have already received from post-secondary institutions.
- 2. Invitations to the June 27, 2018 Graduation ceremony were mailed last week and should be arriving to your home shortly. Please note the RSVP date of June 8. Any families who would like to request more than the allotted 4 tickets, should contact Mrs. O'Connor in the guidance office with \$5 for each additional ticket.

Grade 12 Post-Secondary Information Update

- 1. Students should have heard an admission response to all university programs that they applied to by May 29th. Students interested in accepting an offer of admission should do so **by June 1, 2018.**
- 2. If you applied to an Ontario University and you do not receive an offer of admission, please know that from June 6 August 26, you are eligible to apply to any university program that still has known vacancies. Grade 9 EQAO Schedule

Grade 9 applied and academic math students will be writing the EQAO on Wednesday, June 13 and Thursday June 14th. It is their final exam, and accounts for 30% of their grade. All students have the accommodation to receive extra time, if necessary, to align with regular classroom practices across the province.

In order to accommodate this change, the majority of grade 9 math students will be writing the assessment together in the cafeteria. All math students will be writing the EQAO according to the following schedule:

Wednesday, June 13 - Periods 1 & 2

Thursday, June 14 - Periods 3 & 4

Each day, the assessment is expected to take students 60 minutes to complete. Students will be permitted to continue to write their assessment if they require more time. When students complete their assessment they will be given a slip with the time they finished and are expected to attend their class.

In addition to math help offered from your student's teacher, and during lunch periods from Monday to Thursday in room 309, students are invited to attend after school EQAO prep sessions to refine their skills, close gaps in their learning, and prepare for the assessment. Students will report to room 310 at 2:10 pm beginning on Wednesday, June 6. Prep sessions will continue daily, until Tuesday, June 12, except Friday June 8.


